"After the Crises? Germany and its Partners in a changing Europe"

International Conference at the Munk School of Global Affairs at the University of Toronto, April 20-21, 2012

The crises of the year 2011 - the Euro-crisis and the political crisis in Northern Africa - had a deep political and economic impact on the European Union and Germany as its largest economy and one of its key members. The performance of the European Union and - even more importantly - the EU member states in handling those crises points to a broader and persistent crisis of leadership in the EU. The role the German government played in these developments has been evaluated as problematic at least.

Against this background the international and interdisciplinary conference intends to focus on the consequences of the aforementioned crises for Europe and Germany one year after the onset of the "Arab Spring" and the intensified attempts to contain the Euro crisis.

The aim of the event is to confer on the consequences of the crises for (1) the European Union's ability to cope with current challenges, (2) for Germany and its position in the community, (3) for the fragile transatlantic consensus to deal with political and economic shocks and (4) to look for the "chances for change" growing out of these challenges.
