Mark Blyth is Professor of International Political Economy in the Department of Political Science and Faculty Fellow of the Watson Institute for International Studies at Brown University. He received his PhD in political science from Columbia University and taught at the Johns Hopkins University from 1997 until 2009. He has been a visiting professor at Sciences Po in Paris and at the Copenhagen Business School. Much of his research focuses on the structural dynamics of economic institutions. He is the author of *Great Transformations: Economic Ideas and Institutional Change in the Twentieth Century* (Cambridge: Cambridge University Press, 2002); editor of *The Routledge Handbook of International Political Economy: IPE as a Global Conversation* (New York: Routledge Press, 2009); and co-editor of *Constructing the International Economy* (Cornell University Press, April 2010). His newest book is *Austerity: The History of a Dangerous Idea* (Oxford University Press, March 2013).

Blyth is former editor and continuing member of the editorial board of the *Review* of International Political Economy, and his articles have appeared in journals such as the American Political Science Review, Perspectives on Politics, Comparative Politics, World Politics, the Journal of Evolutionary Economics, Foreign Affairs, and Foreign Policy. He is a member of the Warwick Commission on International Financial Reform.
