Explaining Political Transitions

Course Outline

This course explores the dynamics of regime change from a comparative and historical perspective. In particular, it examines the factors that facilitate and inhibit radical political change. Varying modes of change are analyzed including social revolution, radical reform, fundamentalist reaction and restructuring from above. A major focus will be on the post-1970s global 'Third Wave' of democratic transitions as well as the so-called "Fourth Wave" of post-Communist transitions in Eastern Europe and Asia. A secondary goal of the course is to introduce students to concepts and modes of political analysis.

Format

The course is organized as a colloquium/seminar emphasizing class discussion of common themes. Students may be asked to present brief summaries or critiques of the readings as a means to stimulate discussion.
