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Course Description

This course relies on close readings of leading scholarship to prepare students to assess and carry out research in Canadian political science. By the end of the semester, students are expected to understand the leading debates and approaches in the field, and be able to rigorously evaluate their own and other scholars' research. As such, the core course serves an essential preparation to the major field examination (MFE) in Canadian politics. The course is divided into two sections: 1) Identity and Politics, and 2) Governance and Institutions.

Format

The format of core courses consists of three-hour seminars built around the continued involvement of PhD students in a critical discussion of weekly readings. At the beginning of the semester, students will be assigned the task of leading the discussion for two

specific weeks. The course also features two workshops on reading and writing academic research, one scheduled early in the semester on reading, and a second in the middle of the semester on writing. From time to time, faculty with particular expertise in the week's topic will join the seminar.

Readings

Core courses feature a heavy load in terms of reading requirements, and students will need to plan sufficient time outside of class for preparing adequately. To help you organize your time, each week has **required readings** that students are expected to complete before the seminar. The workload for a typical week consists of one book plus two articles or chapters. The **recommended (MFE) readings** represent seminal books or articles on the same topic that students are expected to gain familiarity with at the time of writing the MFE in Canadian politics.

Assessment

The quality of seminars depends on contributions from everybody. The seminar lead for each week will open the class with a 15-minute presentation. It is expected that they will share a one-page list of discussion questions on the readings and topic the night before class. All students are expected to have completed the required readings, and to be able to provide insightful comments during class discussion. Before each class, students will post on Quercus a short (one paragraph) reflection on the required readings, accompanied by 1-2 questions for discussion.

Students will also produce a term paper on a topic of their choosing, and will present their papers to the class.

The final exam will be a timed, take-home exam designed to serve as a useful practice for the MFE.
