### POL 484H/2026H: Recent Political Theory Alumni Hall 302 Tuesdays 2:10-4:00

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This course will explore two recent discussions in Anglo-American political theory. The first is called the ideal/non-ideal theory debate. It explores questions about the extent to which political theory should strive to be realistic or practice-guiding. The second is called the all affected interests debate. It begins with the moral principle that we ought to take into account all of the interests affected by a given policy or institution and explores the implications of that principle.

# COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND GRADING

The course will be conducted as a seminar. Students are expected to attend regularly and to participate actively in class discussions. There are two writing requirements:

1. A paper on the ideal/non-ideal theory debate. 1500-2000 words for undergraduates, 1800-2300 words for graduate students, including notes. Due October 25. Please submit electronically in word format (.doc). Worth 40% of final grade.

2. A paper on the all affected interests debate. 3000-3500 words for undergraduates, 3500-4000 words for graduate students, including notes. Due December 7. Please submit electronically in word format (.doc). Worth 60% of final grade.
